Rowdy Rooster/ Winlock Foodbank



The Foodbank continues to support more than 100 families in the Winlock /Vader area. As a replacement for the Annual Walk and Knock, the Winlock-Vader Food Bank's Drive and Drop was scheduled for December 2,2023. Community Members brought donations to the Food Bank. The Boy Scouts and other helpers unloaded the cars and sort the donations. This event helped stock the Foodbank before Christmas.

On December 13 there was a food distribution for Christmas supplies. The Foodbank was blessed with turkeys and spiral cut hams that they received from the Lewis County Foodbank Coalition. Community Members were able to get everything needed to prepared a Christmas feast. Santa came to the Rowdy Rooster.

During December an innovative fundraiser was launched to support the Winlock Foodbank. Cookie Trays were sold at the Rowdy Rooster. The Bistro is fast becoming famous for their baked treats. The Rowdy Rooster was closed between Christmas and New Years, giving a much needed rest to the Volunteers. They will be back open January 2, 2024.

Toledo Neighbors Program

On December 19,2023 at 6 pm Toledo Neighbor's held a public meeting at Neighbors' Hall. Starting December 30, 2023 Food Distribution was changed Saturdays from 11 am to 1pm. Food sorting and stocking starts at 10 am. A schedule for volunteers is being developed. Starting in December Neighbors is having a cleaning day the second Tuesday of the month from 3 pm until done. Thanks to LauraLee the Christmas Tree had lights. The meeting room in the Hall was beautifully decorated.

The Christmas Distribution happened on December 17, 1 to 3 pm. Santa and Mrs. Claus were on hand. Pictures were taken. Volunteers and Community Members had a lovely time.

More changes are in the works at Neighbor's Hall. The Board has been drawing up plans for a large garden in the field beside the hall. They expect to have community partners in this exciting project. An artist's drawing of the New Garden is posted on our Large Bulletin Board.

Treasurer's Report for December 2023

It's yet another month when your treasurer does not have complete financial information to report so we will look at the church treasury in general. After Session accepts the financial reports on the 9th of January, a report will be pinned up on the bulletin board in the elevator lobby. You'll also have an opportunity to see all the financial reports at the annual congregational meeting on the 28th of January.



What about a look at how our finance committee functions? First of all, Session appoints a treasurer. The treasurer then oversees the stewardship of the congregation's financial resources by insuring, first of all, that no *one* person is involved in every aspect of the process of "money in, money out". There are seven people who make up the financial committee, two of whom pair up every Sunday after worship to count the collection, make sure each offering is credited to the giver, and prepare the bank deposit. Then the offering is deposited in the Timberland Bank night deposit box.

The following day the treasurer picks up the deposit receipt from the bank and gets the collection information from a secret place in the church. The day after that Rebecca inputs the deposit information into QuickBooks and Donation and pays any bills for which we have received statements. (The treasurer/clerk picks up the church mail three times a week.)

Once a month the treasurer takes the bank statements and a thumb drive to bookkeeper Jess Blinebry who reconciles the statements and cleans up any problems she encounters. She also takes care of any "heavy lifting" the treasurer might come across. Usually just bookkeeping stuff. After a few days the treasurer picks up the reconciled statements and updated flash drive and the new information is restored to QuickBooks.

Once a year Dean Meilke from the Synod Mission Development Certificate Program drives down from the Seattle area to review financial records from the previous year. He then makes recommendations for the finance committee to implement in the future. So far, in this treasurer's experience, there have been no major issues, just a few suggestions regarding process. Dean's review gives us some assurance that we would be ok in the event of an IRS audit. Phew!

Please prayerfully consider joining the team in one capacity or another. We like to have members and especially elders involved, since a degree of discretion is certainly involved. THE DAY AFTER CHRISTMAS

Luke 2:19 Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart.

Read Luke 2: 1-7

After all the joy of Christmas Day, the following day felt like a letdown. We'd stayed overnight with friends but hadn't slept well. Then our car broke down as we were driving home. Then it started to snow. We had to abandoned the car and taxied home in the snow and sleet feeling *blah*.

We're not the only ones who've felt low after Christmas Day. Whether it's from excessive eating, the way carols suddenly disappear from the radio, or the fact that the gifts we bought last week are now on sale at half price, the magic of Christmas Day can quickly dissipate!

The Bible never tells us about the day after Jesus' birth. But we can imagine that after walking to Bethlehem, scrambling for accommodation, Mary's pain in giving birth, and having shepherds drop by unannounced (Luke 2:4-18), Mary and Joseph were exhausted. Yet as Mary cradled her newborn, I can imagine her reflecting on her angelic visitation (Luke 1:30-33), Elizabeth's blessing (verses 42-45), and her own realization of her baby's destiny (verses 46-55). Mary "pondered" such things in her heart (2:19), which must've lightened the tiredness and physical pain of that day.

We'll all have "blah" days, perhaps even the day after Christmas. Like Mary, let's face them pondering the One who came into our world, forever brightening it with his presence. (Author: SHERIDAN VOYSEY)

Insight into Luke 2:15-20

Luke tells us that "all who heard" what had been told to the shepherds abut Jesus' birth "were amazed" (Luke 2:18). In the gospel of Luke, amazement or astonishment is a recurring description of how people respond to God's actions (SEE 1:63; 2:33; 4:22; 8:25; 9:43; 11:14). Amazement is the appropriate and natural response to His wonders. But such amazement isn't identical with belief. For example, in Luke 24:41, after Christ's appearance to His disciples after His death, we're told "they still did not believe it because of joy and amazement." It's possible that Luke emphasizes that "Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart" (2:19) to capture the value of not only reacting with amazement but also continually and daily wrestling with the realities of what God is doing. Luke's comment on Mary's pondering could also indicate Luke relied on her testimony (SEE 1:2-3) for his account of the shepherds.
